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Inside the Pastor's Head

Dear Friends,

There's a lot of understandable debate about different topics in the Christian faith. Predestination vs. free will. Human sexuality. Good Lord have we talked about that one a lot. There are lots of different interpretations that have been done thoughtfully and faithfully on a lot of different issues. People of faith can faithfully disagree. But for the life of me, I can't understand the hateful and dehumanizing rhetoric many Christians have taken in regards to refugees and immigrants. I rarely say, "Scripture is clear." But in the case of immigrants, refugees and strangers, the vast majority of Scripture is clear: We welcome the foreigner. "Cursed is anyone who obstructs the legal rights of immigrants, orphans, or widows."-Deuteronomy 27:19

"Don't mistreat or oppress an immigrant, because you were once immigrants in the land of Egypt."-Exodus 22:21

"I was hungry and you gave me food to eat. I was thirsty and you gave me a drink. I was a stranger and you welcomed me."-Matthew 25:35

Those are just three examples. If I included every verse about welcoming the stranger,

you'd have a mini-dictionary in your hands instead of a church newsletter. I'm not advocating for open borders. I haven't seen anybody advocating for them in the public square either. Personally, I think that is an admirable goal, but I do think Scripture also calls us to use wisdom. A few weeks ago I listened to a short sermon by Bishop Robert Barron a Catholic prelate. There's no doubt that Bishop Barron and I disagree on multiple doctrines and social beliefs. He's a Catholic and I'm United Methodist. However, I really appreciated what he was saying in this message. His main point was that currently in our country we are calling for walls OR bridges. His point was that we need walls AND bridges. We need both. I agree with him. Sometimes we need walls. There are legitimate threats and we need boundaries. Other

times, we need bridges. Bridges help bring people together and remind us of our common humanity.

For awhile now, I'm astonished to see how people of faith have forgotten about our need for bridges. Scripturally speaking, I just don't see how we have gotten here. The truth is, we have let our culture affect us. We have let fear infiltrate us. Xenophobia, fear of the foreigner and stranger, has become a virus in the church, and this is sinful. It is not reflective of the call God has given us in Scripture. A nationwide refugee ban is just not something that we should be quiet about. This is a policy that is not in line with Scripture and it is harming vulnerable people whom we are called to care about.

We are called to be people of compassion, mercy and hospitality. Those are basic concepts of the Christian faith. I'd encourage us to contact our elected officials and ask that, because of our faith, we welcome the foreigner as God has welcomed us. Let us use wisdom, absolutely. But we cannot be controlled by fear.

Jesus calls us to be the salt of the world, and that means we need to be salty and stand out against racism.
1/26 The Gospel in Children's Books: Making Boundaries with Mice: We began our fun series on Children's Books with the classic, "If you Give a Mouse a Cookie." In this story, there was a boy who had really poor boundaries with a mouse. He did not let the mouse do anything for himself. We have to remember that each of us have the capacity to "work out our own salvation" and while we are called to serve others, we are not called to have others become dependent on us. Boundaries honor God and they help us build healthy relationships.

ABIDE


